## McLaren Falls Picnic

To introduce myself, I am Geoff Muir and we (+ Glennys my wife) joined the club about 6 months ago after purchasing our 2006 XK convertible. We live at Fairview Estate were there several other club members.

We drove from home thru the Athenree and Karangahape Gorges to the "The Old Forge Kitchen Café" at Te Aroha West in fine weather. We had not been to Te Aroha West for at least 25 years and were surprised at the changes to this village. We used to pass thru on our way to the Coromandel and would stop to buy some of the wonderful Swiss Sausage & Salami that were produced on the site of the new café by a Swiss Family who farmed there. The pairs of 'Landjäger' were our favourite, but the owner passed away in the early 90's and they were no more.

Arriving at the Café soon after 10, there were 20+ cars from 1960's Mark IIs to late model 'F's, and there familiar faces as well as many new ones all seated in the well-appointed premises enjoying everything from just coffee to full English breakfasts with the Jaguar based chatter. We were all marshalled to leave the café about 11:30 and headed north in convoy along Mace Road to turn right onto Te Aroha Gordon Road. In my many years of traversing the eastern Waikato this was a road not previously travelled. After cresting the summit and down the BOP side we had to patiently wait in a queue to turn right off the main road to proceed to McLaren Falls. Amazing amount of traffic coming up the hill!

We had never been to McLaren Falls before, it was one of those destinations that we had said we must do one day, and it was worth it.

The reserve has a myriad of grassy flats separated by native bush and connected by well-sealed narrow tracks around the lake that is the reservoir for the small BOP Hydro scheme.
